SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT DECEMBER 10, 2023



THE WORD OF GOD FOR TODAY: MARK 1: 1-8

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

As it is written in the Prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight'," John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole country side and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful that I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

REFLECTING ON THE GOSPEL

During this past week, we celebrated the feast of St Nicholas, a 4th century bishop. There was a tradition in Germany and Poland for children to dress up like bishops on December 6 and go out to beg donations for the poor. That taught the children 1) that we all have to take care of one another, 2) that people who are well off should be generous, and 3) that bishops and other leaders should always remember the poor and help them.

John the Baptist, the first person we meet in the Gospel of Mark, taught similar lessons. The way he dressed and the food he ate were a kind of protest. He had given up the security and convenience of his ordinary life in order to wake people up. John's lifestyle and preaching did shake people up and nudged them to something greater. He awakened people to see that they were living in a spiritual desert, and challenged them to change their ways.

Mark, the Gospel-writer, tells us that John the Baptist was sent by God. John was convinced that his people's lifestyle was not worthy of God's people – and he spoke up. God is still sending prophets to awaken us and help us to see.

VIOLET VESTMENTS

reflect longing and anticipation, not penance.
Rose vestments may be used on the third (Gaudete)
Sunday to signal the mid-point of the season.

The GLORY TO GOD

is not sung and the organ and other musical instruments are used in moderation to allow us to anticipate the full joy of December 25th, when they are taken up again.

Flowers may be used, but in moderation so as to leave a sense of



abundance for the

Nativity.
